



Fig.1 Power Dissipation Derating Curve




Fig.2 Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig.3 Normalized Transient Thermal Resistance vs. Pulse Width





Fig.4 Single Pulse Maximum Power Dissipation

Fig.5 Typical Output Characteristics(I)




Fig.6 Typical Output Characteristics(II)





Fig.7 Normalized Breakdown Voltage vs. Junction Temperature

Fig.8 Typical Transfer Characteristics




Fig.9 Gate Threshold Voltage vs. Junction Temperature





Fig.10 Forward Transfer Admittance vs. Drain Current

Fig.11 Drain Current Derating Curve




Fig.12 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Gate Source Voltage





Fig.13 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Junction Temperature

Fig.14 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(I)




Fig.15 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(II)





Fig.16 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(III)

Fig.17 Typical Capacitances vs. Drain - Source Voltage




Fig.18 Switching Characteristics




Fig.19 Typical Gate Charge





Fig.20 Source Current vs. Source Drain Voltage

Fig.1 Power Dissipation Derating Curve




Fig.2 Maximum Safe Operating Area




Fig.3 Normalized Transient Thermal Resistance vs. Pulse Width





Fig.4 Single Pulse Maximum Power Dissipation

Fig.5 Typical Output Characteristics(I)




Fig.6 Typical Output Characteristics(II)





Fig.7 Normalized Breakdown Voltage vs. Junction Temperature

Fig.8 Typical Transfer Characteristics




Fig.9 Gate Threshold Voltage vs. Junction Temperature





Fig.10 Forward Transfer Admittance vs. Drain Current

Fig.11 Drain Current Derating Curve




Fig.12 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Gate Source Voltage





Fig.13 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Junction Temperature

Fig.14 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(I)




Fig.15 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(II)





Fig.16 Static Drain - Source On - State Resistance vs. Drain Current(III)

Fig.17 Typical Capacitances vs. Drain - Source Voltage




Fig.18 Switching Characteristics




Fig.19 Typical Gate Charge





Fig.20 Source Current vs. Source Drain Voltage

Fig.1-1 Switching Time Measurement Circuit




Fig.1-2 Switching Waveforms




Fig.2-1 Gate Charge Measurement Circuit





Fig.2-2 Gate Charge Waveform

Fig.3-1 Switching Time Measurement Circuit




Fig.3-2 Switching Waveforms




Fig.4-1 Gate Charge Measurement Circuit





Fig.4-2 Gate Charge Waveform


